Key City Updates

- Twenty of the positive COVID-19 cases reported to this date by L.A. County are individuals who are currently experiencing homelessness.
- A crew member aboard the USNS Mercy has tested positive for the novel coronavirus. The crew member is currently isolated aboard the ship, and will soon transfer to an off-ship isolation facility to self-monitor for severe symptoms.
- Mayor Eric Garcetti has mandated that workers in essential businesses wear face coverings and authorized businesses to refuse service/entry to customers who aren't wearing them.
- Mayor Eric Garcetti announced Monday evening, April 6, 2020, that any L.A. County resident who has symptoms and wants to be tested for the coronavirus can now apply online. Testing was previously limited to vulnerable populations, including those 65 and older, and those with compromised immune systems.
- As of April 5, 2020, a total of 31 Farmers Markets have COVID-19 compliance plan

approved by the City of Los Angeles Street Services.

- Mayor Garcetti announced the City of Los Angeles is requiring construction companies to develop a COVID-19 plan.
- The Medical Surge Task Force is working to furnish the Convention Center with equipment for patient care.

Key National Updates: Updated April 9, 2020

- University of Washington's Institute for Health Metrics and Evaluation (IHME) model projected the number of American deaths from coronavirus has dropped dramatically in recent days because Americans have drastically changed their behavior. As of April 8th, the model predicted 60,000 deaths in the U.S. over the next four months, which is about 33,000 less than the model estimated on April 2nd.
- While the US is still expected to face a shortage of about 16,000 hospital beds, it will need 168,000 fewer beds than previously expected, according to the new analysis.
- As of April 9th, the State of New York has reported more confirmed cases of COVID-19 than any other state or country.

Key Global Updates: Updated April 9, 2020

- CDC deployed eight community protection field teams as part of an initiative to work directly with state and local health departments to keep coronavirus cases contained where transmission rates are low.
- On April 7th, China reported 62 new cases of COVID-19 with all but three of them imported. They also reported two deaths.
- Japan declared a State of Emergency in Tokyo and six other regions as cases spike.
