1). Welcome & Call to Order; Introductions; Approval of the Agenda

2). Public Comments (1-2 minutes per speaker)

3). **Monitoring Conditions on Development Projects, Specifically Tree Planting and Maintenance:**

When developers ask for “entitlements” (i.e., discretionary requests for elements that are not by right) for their proposed housing, commercial or mixed-use projects, the City will also impose conditions on the project, such as the planting of specific trees in front of the new building(s). New trees may also be required on ministerial/by right construction projects. But, how does the City monitor the imposed conditions afterwards? Is an initial requirement permanent? Is the property owner required to water and maintain trees that were a condition of approval? If a tree dies after ten years, is the property owner required to plant a new one? – **DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE RECOMMENDATION/ACTION**

4). **Proposal to co-name a segment of Crenshaw Boulevard to commemorate Malcolm X:**

Torrence Brannon-Reese, MSW, Founding Director, FA-MLI, Inc., and Shaka Satori Sr., President, African-American Legacy Foundation, request UNNC’s support for an effort to co-name a 2.5-mile stretch of Crenshaw Boulevard from the 10 freeway south to Florence Boulevard after Malcolm X. This includes the segment within UNNC's footprint as well as several other neighborhood councils.

The proposal reads in part: *"For purposes of clarity, this effort would not rename Crenshaw Blvd. As is the case in Harlem, New York, a sign reading Malcolm X Boulevard, would be joined with Crenshaw Boulevard, paying homage to Malcolm X, while respecting the Iconic thoroughfare that is Crenshaw Boulevard. Both names would be respected by the U.S. Postal Service. Finally, as Crenshaw is a major thoroughfare, running through the last majority Black district in Los Angeles, we feel it is significant enough to bear the name of Malcolm X, someone so significant to our history and culture. Malcolm X Blvd. will also intersect with Nipsey Hussle Square, further codifying the legacy of a young man who exemplified the redemption, evolution, courage, commitment, and communal spirit of Malcolm X."*

5). **New Initiatives to preserve the City's "RSO" rent stabilized housing units**

Discussion of several pending City Council motions and initiatives to encourage the retention of, and/or 1-to-1 replacement of, existing RSO/rent stabilized units, which often are affordable units on a practical basis. In prior “TOC” and other density-bonus project applications within UNNC’s footprint, occasionally fewer restricted affordable units were being provided in the new building than the number of RSO units proposed for demolition. There are currently a number of City Council Motions addressing this, including Council File Nos. 20-0047, 21-0035*, and 20-1106. – **DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE ACTION**

Public comment is limited to 1 minute per speaker, unless waived by the presiding officer of the Board or Committee.

Please note: All UNNC stakeholders are invited to participate in UNNC Standing Committee meetings. UNNC's Governing Board appoints Committee Chairs and Co-Chairs annually; these positions are open to all stakeholders. Per UNNC practice and policy, all stakeholders present at a Standing Committee meeting, including members of UNNC's Governing Board, are considered to be members of that committee for the duration of that meeting, and may equally participate, including by making motions and voting. Any action taken at the meeting is only a recommendation to the Governing Board; no Standing Committee may act on behalf of the Governing Board without prior authorization. UNNC's Governing Board members may be in attendance at its Standing Committee meetings as participants or observers. Per the California Open Meetings Act ("The Ralph M. Brown Act"), in accordance with Government Code Chapter 9 / meetings [54950 - 54963], Section 54952 (b), UNNC's Standing Committees are "legislative bodies" for the purposes of this Chapter. And, in accordance with Section 54952.2. (c) (6), nothing in this section prevents the attendance of a majority of the members of a legislative body at an open and noticed meeting of a standing committee of that body.

Telecommunication Relay Services

Telephone communication is one of the most important forms of communication in society today. Due to advancements in technology, telephone devices have evolved with new services and capabilities. Individuals who are deaf and hard of hearing, and individuals with a speech disability are following these trends and are rapidly migrating to more advanced telecommunications methods, both for peer-to-peer and third-party telecommunications relay service (TRS) communications.

Telecommunications Relay Service is a telephone service that allows persons with hearing or speech disabilities to place and receive telephone calls. TRS is available in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and the U.S. territories for local and/or long distance calls. TRS providers - generally telephone companies - are compensated for the costs of providing TRS from either a state or a federal fund. There is no cost to the TRS user. What forms of TRS are available? There are several forms of TRS, depending on the particular needs of the user and the equipment available: TRS includes: Text to Voice TIY-Based TRS; Speech-to-Speech Relay Service; Shared Non-English Language Relay Service; Captioned Telephone Relay Service; Internet Protocol Relay Service; and Video Relay Service.

Don't hang up! Some people hang up on TRS calls because they think the Communications Assistant (CA) is a telemarketer. If you hear, "Hello. This is the relay service . . ." when you pick up the phone, please don't hang up! You are about to talk, through a TRS provider, to a person who is deaf, hard-of-hearing, or has a speech disability.

If you have limitations hearing or speaking a specially-trained CA can relay telephone conversations for all of your calls. In California, dial 711 to reach the California Relay Service (CRS). If you prefer having your calls immediately answered in your mode of communication, dial one of the toll-free modality- and language-specific numbers below. The call will be routed to the CRS provider.

No part of the conversation that takes place between callers is revealed or recorded in written, verbal, or any other form. CRS CAs do not participate in the conversation and acquire no benefit from information relayed.
